Education

- 9 Ospreys Need Clean water presentations to 283 children, 64 adults.
- Co-taught a class for educators on reading topographical river maps and civilian scientists water testing.
- Intern, Carrick Palmer, taught civilian scientists water testing to 36 students and 9 adults as part of the NYS DEC WAVE program to monitor NYS streams and rivers.
- Helped Chemung County Soil & Water Conservation District teach rain barrel use classes to public and the Elmira Garden Club.
- Organized a Nature Strollers wagon ride through Big Flats federal plants materials center to learn how plants reduce erosion.
- 90-minute presentation on owls and the environment for 82 scholars at Finn Academy charter school in Elmira.
- Summer school presentation on "why water is important" to 16 students at Hendy Elementary School in Elmira.







Environmental stewardship

- Cleaned litter from Lackawanna Rail Trail in Elmira with more than 100 students and parents from Finn Academy.
- Dozen trash cleanups involving more 30 volunteers from May until now.

- River Riverside Patriots boat launch (5) cleanups.
- Maintained and cleared vegetation from two wooden bench swings we installed along West Elmira trails.
- Employees from our partner, Copy Express, in Elmira and River Friends volunteers and staff removed more 800 pounds of trees, brush, vegetation and debris from Katy Leary Community Park in Elmira.
